Headteacher's Report

Welcome to our Summer Term Newsletter...and what amazing stories it provides! As a community we should take pride and perhaps shout louder about all the wonderful things our young people have been up to both in and out of school. We need to appreciate how very special our young people are.

As the only secondary school we can, on occasions, take the brunt of any negativity from a small number in our community about some of our students, including the inevitable 'what is that school doing about them.....'. For those doubters I will always say... contact us, book a time to come and have a look around. any day of the year, and see what great things our students are up to.

Our summer term Newsletter always goes out to those families who will be starting with us in September. My colleagues have visited all of our Primary Schools over the last few weeks as well as providing a variety of experiences for our Year 6s in our school. They all tell me what an impressive set of young people we can expect to see come September; so much talent and so much desire to grow. As always if any incoming parent has concerns or questions please get in touch. Nobody should be worrying over the summer break.

Our Year 11 and 13 year groups have now finished their exams and we wish them all the best for their results and their future adult lives. As we all get older we become more and more reliant on what the next generation will bring to our world.

Next academic year we believe that we need to make further decisions around key aspects of how the school will operate on a daily basis. There will be some changes to

how we deliver our teaching and learning so that more of our students make rapid progress in our school. There will also be changes to our Positive Behaviour structures so that we can all work together in a harmonious and respectful environment. More about these when we return to school in September. There are however two areas that I have already written to you about.

One is about uniform. We believe that we must place more emphasis on the importance of our school uniform and that all our students respect the requests we make about it. We will be making more of an issue of any shortfalls in how our students conform to our rules regarding uniform.

The second one is about the use of mobile phones. Having taken on board a wide range of views and research that has included yourselves, my colleagues, OfSted and what other secondary schools are doing in Northumberland we have made the decision that mobiles phones, for Years 7 to 11, will not be allowed to be seen or used while students are on the school site. We accept, because of the rurality of our catchment and the number of extras that our students are involved in after school that students may have them in their bags..... but, as I have said, they must not be seen, or used, during the school day. If students want to contact parents or parents contact their children... they should go

through the school system.

Fundamentally it is about making things easier and simpler for all of us so our young people can concentrate on the key reason for being in school - learning, growing and dare I say it, face to face conversations.

Finally, a question for us all. I have concerns that sometimes we can be considered too 'Alnwickcentric' and families that live in other areas of our catchment do not get the same attention. I would like to discuss this further with willing parents to see how we can develop a greater presence in the other key villages/towns in our local community. I believe there is much more we can do as a community school to support all of our catchment and celebrate what a great place North Northumberland is to live and grow up in.

Hope everyone has a fantastic summer.

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ALLERGIES

We have a growing number of students in school with severe nut allergies (covering a whole range from peanuts to pistachios). Some of these allergies are very serious and rapid in their reaction. Please be mindful of this if you are preparing packed lunches or snacks for students, and, where possible, avoid including nut products (or, if necessary, place in a sealed container).

Whilst this is difficult to police we ask for your help and cooperation to ensure minimum impact on students' welfare. Please discuss with your child the potential impact of what is bought by students from shops and cafes and brought into school.

Our school kitchen does not use any nuts in the preparation of meals and snacks. School also delivers assemblies to all year groups regarding anaphylaxis to raise awareness and understanding.

As I am you sure you will agree our primary concern is to ensure the safety of our students. We now have over 20 coaches/minibuses and numerous private taxis dropping off and collecting students in the morning and evening; it is incredibly busy.

In order to support us we request that any drop offs and collections take place in the Willowburn Leisure Centre car park. Please do not use our car park to drop students off unless they have mobility issues or other issues that we have been made aware of. Please also do not park on either Willowburn Avenue or on Taylor Drive as this leads to unsafe crossings for students and also prevents the school transport from getting onto the site. Taylor Drive is now marked with double yellow lines.

We are getting ever closer to our trip to the Galapagos next year. Students on the trip have been organising a 'Big clean up Alnwick day on the 7th July' where they will be out and about litter picking in and around the town with the support of local businesses in the town who have sponsored them.

We also have just recently held a successful car boot sale in the school car park on Saturday 15th June. Mrs Doctor worked closely with Alnwick Lions to make this possible. We had 20 cars arrive on the day and it was great to see many people (students, parents and



colleagues) attached to school supporting the event.

The money raised from this event has been put in the Galapagos fundraising pot to support the students. Individual students have also been doing their own fundraising as the year has been going on such as dog walking, cake sales and cleaning cars.

We also have been given the opportunity in the Autumn term to do a bag pack at Morrisons. Date to be confirmed.

CONSERVATION CLUB

The Conservation club this term have been working hard on planting up and looking after a couple of raised beds at the front of the school. They are currently growing both flowers and edible foods. Other Gardening projects are also ongoing around the school, which are being managed by Mrs Darby.

They have also created some posters on Recycling, Reusing and Reducing which are going up on notice boards in classrooms around the school.

They are in the process of conducting a questionnaire with staff and students around the school to try to understand where we are as a school with Recycling, Reducing and Reusing materials so that suggestions can be put forward to improve what we already do.

Did you know that?

All children from the age of 13 years and who are working must be registered with the Local Authority and be issued with a work permit.

It is an offence for an employer to employ children without registering with the local authority first.

The numbers of hours you can work whilst attending school are restricted. Children must not work before 7am and after 7pm.

Any children working without a permit is not covered by their employer's liability insurance.

a tea party for the Duchess's Community High School's Magistrates Team and their parents and sponsors who came together to celebrate an astounding third place in the national final of the Magistrates' Court Mock Trial competition which was held in the Royal Courts of Justice on Saturday 15th June. The team had travelled to London to take on 16 schools from across the country after success in the local and regional heats. The party was held at Alnwick Castle where the girls shared a short presentation of their hard work and thanked the sponsors of the team. At the end of the party, there was a special video

message from The Chase's Legal Eagle, Barrister Shaun Wallace who congratulated the team and their teachers.

The 12 girls began their journey in March when they took part in the local heats of the competition at Newcastle Crown Court. Having spent weeks preparing their case, they were up against 16 schools from



across the County. Their hard work and weeks of rehearsals paid off and they emerged as winners, earning a place in the regional heats against schools from Durham, Teeside and Cumbria.

The team had just under 4 weeks to prepare a new case for the regional final. Once again, they worked hard and raised the bar even higher to win a place in the national final in London. The challenge for them now was to prepare 2 cases for the final and to plan a trip to the nation's capital. It was agreed to travel down early to take in the sights and prepare for their day in court.

With only a £150 travel bursary available, the team was faced with an additional financial challenge. They reached out to the local community for support and were met with a fantastic response from Councillor Gordon Castle, Northumberland Estates, The Rotary Club of Alnwick and the Mayor and Town Council of Alnwick.

As news spread of the team's success, they were invited to BBC Radio Newcastle to talk about their work. Abigail, Izzy and Pandora spent the afternoon being interviewed and exploring the BBC studios. Their interviews were broadcast on the radio throughout the day of the final.

The Magistrates' Court Mock Trial Competition is part of the Young Citizens 'citizenship experiences' and helps to improve young people's life skills, their understanding of the justice system and the legal



system, and helps them to understand that the law touches every aspect of their lives. It has been running since 1994 and annually involves over 4,000 students from over 270 schools across England, Wales and Northern Ireland.

The students, aged 12-14, take part in mock trials inside magistrates' courts and crown courts using specially written cases, in the roles of magistrates, defendants, witnesses, lawyers, legal advisers and ushers, giving them a unique opportunity to gain knowledge and awareness

of the legal system and how it works. As well as learning about different aspects of the law, the team have also gained skills in public speaking, critical thinking and team work. Throughout the competition, they have supported each other so well and have been a credit to the school, their parents and the community. When we were out and about in London, we lost count of the times that members of the public praised them for their excellent behaviour and accomplished social skills.




Author visit for Year Eight Students

Christy Ducker from Newcastle University also visited us in the Spring, and gave two fantastic workshops on the theme of 'transformations'. She helped us to write poems for the inaugural Newcastle Poetry Festival.

We also welcomed poet, publisher, and academic **Lisa Matthews**. Lisa is an expert on prose poems, and we presented her with a prose poem pamphlet we had written in response to a poem that she had sent us earlier in the year. Lisa helped us to make very unusual 3D poems, which we hope we are going to display electronically in school. She also gave every student two books!



In the summer term, some of the poetry club students went to the **Northern Poetry Library** in Morpeth to take part in a Read Regional workshop with poet **Linda France**, and to hear **Clare Shaw** read from her collection. Clare answered some of our questions about poetry and signed copies of her book.



We finished the year in style, with two poetry club members winning the **Newcastle Poetry Competition! Dorit Greene** and **Izzy Hamer** were two of 12 winners, picked from over 170 entries from all over the UK. Dorit was very brave and read out both poems at the prize-giving event, which was held at the Nort hern Stage as part of the Newcastle Poetry Festival.

Alnwick In Bloom 2019



Careers: Thinking about the future and Aiming High

As the summer term draws to a close it is a good opportunity to reflect on another successful year as we continue to work towards providing our students with an excellent series of experiences that focused on careers, and to look forward to the next academic year and the continuing careers work we are developing.

Back in the autumn term we were delighted with the joint Year 7 & 8 'Inspire Me' event that we developed with Pathfinder/Northern Rights which helped our students at the beginning of their life in school with understanding what university and apprenticeships are and for our students to work with Northumberland College Forensic Science and Zoo Team, Northumberland Estates and Air Cadets. We were also delighted with the excellent 'Duck Production' enterprise event for Year 7 organised by Mrs Eggleston in the summer term where students had a wonderful experience of working on their own duck company development! We were also impressed as the year developed with the opportunities for some of our students in Year 10 to do some work shadowing with local companies like Blackshaws, Pure Fishing, Lionheart Garage, Tiger Lifting & Swansfield School to develop employability skills and to experience what a working environment could be like.

We were also delighted that a number of our students across Years 9, 11 and 6th form had the opportunity to take part in impartial careers interviews that produced individual student action plans to move them forward towards considering different careers or to prepare for apprenticeship applications, job applications or their future at university and beyond.

In addition to this we were also delighted to help students with apprenticeship or college applications as well as continuing to run our external business forums where local businesses have come into school to share career experiences and stories about the jobs that are available and that young people might aspire to! Some of the highlights this year saw a broad mix of Global, Regional and local businesses

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supporting including DXC (digital technology, project management, leadership), Nexus (Passenger Transport), Pure Fishing (factory work, Engineering, Finance), NHS Healthcare, Northern Clothing Company (owning your own business, working in an SME) and Reheat (Biomass energy specialists).

We were also excited to take a group of Year 10 Engineer students to the Tolent site where they are developing the new retail area courtesy of the Northumberland Estates Education team. We enjoyed a wet and windy trip seeing the different types of trades that might be available and to see the new outlets being built. We have also seen many local businesses contacting us directly when they have jobs either seasonal or more permanent through apprenticeships for potential employees in our student body. We have successfully placed students in conjunction with businesses this year. We actively encourage employers to contact us if they have opportunities in their work places as we think we have many potentially excellent employees in our school community!

Looking forwards into the next academic year we are continuing to expand and further develop our careers provision. Some highlights to watch out for in addition to our current work is the development of a DCHS Careers Alumni where we will be asking the local community and a variety of ex students from across the years to share stories about their careers for publication on our website as case studies and inspiration for our current students. We are very excited to develop this part of our careers programme. So if you have a story to share we would be

delighted to hear from you! In addition we are looking to continue to develop work with Northumberland Estates and to offer CV workshops and Mock Interview opportunities for students on the verge of leaving education to be fully prepared for their next steps and we want to involve parents more in the types of careers offer we have in the school so that you can help us to continue to improve our services.

We are delighted to continue to work with Northernrights/Pathfinders and local businesses to give our students as much information on the Local Labour Market information and to engage with the opportunities that exist within our community.

It is an exciting time to be involved in careers and the positive talks we are encouraging for our young people as they think about their futures.

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Our Relationship With Rotary

The Duchess's Community High School enjoys a very close and meaningful relationship with Rotarians in Alnwick Rotary Club which supports and helps our school community in a wide variety of ways.

This support impacts on students of all ages through the school, from the early years through to the sixth form. Alnwick Rotarians help to run and sponsor Rotakids Clubs in both St Michael's and Swansfield Park Schools. Through the activities of these Clubs, members aged 12 and under are helped to develop citizenship and leadership skills through taking responsibility for real life situations and problems within their local community and indeed globally. Upon entering The Duchess's School, Rotakids make the transition to the Interact Club which caters for young people aged 12 to 18. Through the auspices of Interact, student members gain an understanding of the Rotary values of 'Service Above Self' and continue to engage in activities which are of benefit to those less fortunate than themselves as well as developing confidence and leadership skills.



Turning to support for students throughout the school, various competitions and activities sponsored by Rotarians are open for all who wish to enter. These include Rotary Youth Leadership Awards and Rotary Youth Competitions. This year Alnwick Rotary Club has worked with school staff to stage 4 competitions, namely Young Writers, Young Photographer, Young Musician and Young Chef. This competition was judged by members of Alnwick and District Camera Club and the judges commented on the impressively high standard of the entries in general. Turning to the Young Musician competition, 9 young musicians, 6 vocalists and 3 instrumentalists, performed with inspirational talent and great skill for the audience and judges, with winning



performances being awarded to Gregory Brewis on electric guitar and vocalists Ruby Faulke and Palesa Thompson. Greg and Palesa went on to perform extremely well in the Regional Final held in Glasgow. Finally, we had eleven entries for the Young Chef competition, for which students cooked superb three course meals. We offer warmest congratulations to first prize winner, Kayleigh Ramshaw and runner up Daniel Bradley. Kayleigh went on to cook another superb meal in the Regional Final of the competition that was held in East Kilbride.

Alnwick Rotary Club provides judges, prizes and administrative support for all of these competitions in addition to giving prizes for the School Prize-giving event.

It has also been the great pleasure of the Rotary Club to be a sponsor for the finalists of the Magistrate in the Community Mock Trials competition who travelled to London for this event where they came third in the national finals. What an amazing achievement and warmest congratulation from all Rotarians.

Last but certainly not least, our relationship with Rotary extends to academic support for our sixth form. A Rotarian spends significant time conducting mock university interviews with sixth form students applying for university early

entrance and providing appropriate feedback and advice.

So, Alnwick Rotarians are welcomed into The Duchess's High School on a regular basis in connection with these many and various youth activities. Yet the 'comings and goings' are not solely in one direction. The school choir performs at the Rotary Club's Christmas lunch and students are invited from time as guest speakers at the Club.

Our year of a splendid relationship with Rotary culminated in a gathering on June 14th which was a celebration of the Rotary Club's support for young people in the community. 

Team DCHS VEX Robotics - regional winners again

On Tuesday 7th May, Team DCHS VEX took part in the North East season finale of the international VEX IQ Robotics challenge at Nissan, Sunderland. This competition involves designing and building a multi-purpose robot that can be driven to perform a range of different tasks and also be programmed to solve challenges autonomously.





Throughout the day the team battled through a series of heats and were firmly placed at the top of the leaderboard after 10 rounds. Teams from 8 regional schools competed with partner schools from across the north east to score points in a number of challenges. **Team DCHS VEX won the overall Team Challenge and the Driver Skills challenge** (including programming tasks).

The team of year 7 students included **Kathryn Ball, Ben Allan, Louis Mascall, Joe Bottomer** and **Will Thompson** were a hugely positive reflection of our students at DCHS and worked professionally with the teams they were competing with on the day, developing winning strategies and training their partner teams to use the technology accordingly. Core skills for DT and their futures!

The team are now preparing to work alongside the next generation of roboteers and our feeder primary schools following the successful award of more robotics kits from the Royal Academy of Engineering and are looking forward to competing again in the 2019-20 season alongside them. The team will be demonstrating their robotics skills at the Wonderdome event in July.

Engineers at Tolent

On Wednesday 12th June our year 10 BTEC Engineering students took part in a site visit to experience how engineering skills are used in the design and construction of the new retail development at the Willowburn site in Alnwick. Torrential rain did not dampen their enthusiasm and students were able to meet with site engineers, project managers and architects to discuss career opportunities and experience the types of skills being used and the expectations of employers. They were surprised to hear about the short design life some of the prefabricated units will have - less than the time that they will spend at DCHS, and also the significant investment being made by retailers on the site.

Greenpower electric race car team - the next generation

Team DCHS Greenpower have been busy behind the scenes fundraising to enable them to buy a students self-build kit car that will be usable by student teams for the foreseeable future. Their target is to reach £3000. The team has created a range of products that they can design, customise, make and sell in school using the DT department's laser cutter and have approached local businesses to help sell the products. The team have also been selling these items and other technological

gadgets and toys at their STEM shop and have also developed a website to promote their cause and enable orders to be placed on line. The team are contacting local businesses directly and writing funding bids so are developing important skills for their futures. Future events will include a supermarket bag pack, the Wonderdome STEM shop (at the event in July open to the community so please book a ticket) and other exciting activities yet to be announced. The Greenpower team currently consists of a range of year 8 and year 9 students and are keen to hear from anyone in a position to sponsor the team!

Lego Robotics - preparing for 2020

The regional final winning team have been working hard to refine and improve their designs since their success in the Spring at the Tomorrows Engineers regional competition. The team is keen to compete again next year and have been fundraising with some of the best cakes ever seen in school to raise money in order to buy further LEGO mindstorms equipment for the new year 7 students when they join us in September. One of their goals is to mentor the new team and are motivated to improve on their overall result from this year with two DCHS teams competing for places at the national Big Bang science fair in 2020. Gardening at DCHS

Outside the school reception we are also lucky to have a series of raised beds. We are lucky to have enough capacity for there to be beds for different groups of students to look after, including the science department, the conservation club and nurture groups at lunchtime. Students are learning to care for onions, bank up potatoes and of course there are constant weeding and litter picking



In the Autumn, gardening at DCHS will be reaching for the sky with the arrival of over 400 trees, donated from the Woodland Trust. We hope for a parents and local business' planting event in which groups and individuals will be able to sponsor a tree. Full of Pride

On Tuesday 21st May, staff and students at The Duchess's Community High School got together to show their support for Northumberland Pride, an even held in Alnwick on June 1st.

Students were given the opportunity to contribute to a public art installation, dubbed the 'Rainbow Window', during the school day. Staff and student helpers from the sixth-form manned the large window area just above the main atrium and provided colourful chalk pens for students to use on the glass.

The students were invited to contribute their thoughts and feelings in response to sentence starts such as 'Pride is...' and 'I feel pride for...' in the pattern of a rainbow.

Around an estimated 300 students wrote comments on the rainbow which started out rather bare, but soon looked bright and colourful as more words were added.

"We wanted to show our support for the LGBTQ+ community, and to celebrate what makes us all unique and feel proud," said Bex Makamure, one of the staff members involved in the project.

Rosie Bush, another teacher, added, "We're lucky enough to host Northumberland Pride in Alnwick and wanted to help our students see that

Comments written on the window were overwhelmingly mature and quite moving. Many students wrote that they felt pride for their family and friends, and some penned advice such as "Be proud of being you" and "Don't let others change you".

The art installation helped students and staff continue the dialogue about the Pride message and created a real buzz around the school, as well as a bit of colour!





Community Work



Throughout the year the Duchess Community Developers, a group of year 8 and 9 students, have been working with Community@NE66 on a community based project funded by the Nineveh Charitable Trust and Community@NE66 Charitable Trust with some materials gifted by MKM.

DCD have shown a great deal of enthusiasm and have learned lots of new skills while contributing to the local community. In particular, they have worked tirelessly to transform the garden at Alnwick Community Centre, which is used by lots of different community groups.

The boys were given the brief to create a sensory garden that was fun for all. After researching and sourcing materials they set to work creating a sensory path, sound board, fidget board, herb gardens and much more.



They have shown immense grit and determination and have worked hard despite what the great British weather has thrown at them! DCD are keen to add more to the garden over the coming weeks and the youth workers have already received great feedback from the community groups using the garden.

As well as the garden the students have painted parts of the Community Centre, made planters for Hospice Care North Northumberland and have completed litter picks at several locations throughout the community.

They have also enjoyed trips to Clarty Commandos at Howick Hall Gardens which have provided great learning experiences for the group. The group have demonstrated responsibility and achievement when learning new bushcraft and survival skills, including axe throwing, fire lighting and cooking on an open fire.



Mortal Fools

In April the Creative Arts Department was fortunate enough to secure funding of £1500 through the Community Foundation and Culture Bridge North East, to develop a pilot project with Theatre Company, Mortal Fools to work specifically with a group of Year 8 boys.

The focus of the project was to build confidence, sustain focus and to develop creative ways of learning and partnership. The project was designed as part of a developing programme of Creative Learning, as part of our Art Mark Gold and Cultural development within DCHS, to give a voice, sense of place and platform for creativity to our young people.

Mortal Fools are a Theatre , Drama and Cultural organisation based in Prudhoe, Northumberland. This was a

partnership long in the planning but one which was greatly anticipated by the Creative Arts Team.

At the start of this adventure, one of the boys informed me that he would not be doing any performing of any sort, and was not going to be on stage...little did he know!


The six boys who participated in the workshops were understandably nervous as to what they had been signed up to but I think the novelty of 4 days off timetable over 2 weeks was enough incentive to begin with! The trust they placed in each other and in the actors / directors from the moment they met Helen, Sian and Rachael was incredible. It would be fair to say that for some of the boys involved, Drama simply wasn't 'their thing'. However



from the moment they warmed up, through to improvisation, concept development and then the proudest moment for all of us...the creation of a piece of work to perform...to an audience!



On the final day, the boys created a short piece of drama, working together to create characters, scenarios, roles etc, but choreographed the lighting, sound and set to bring their drama to life. That in itself was an amazing leap forward for many, but the real test was to come...the performance. They performed with confidence and with professionalism and left a profound impact on all those who watched the performance.



The biggest challenge for many of our young men is lack of confidence and self belief - at some point all six boys questioned this. However what they learnt about teamwork, listening, articulation of personal thoughts and ideas, being able to listen without judgement to conflicting opinions and being able to work together to create a successful production.

Staff who came along to watch the performance were really struck by the collaborative and mature nature of the boys, their willingness and resilience of performing their work and their bravery speaking in front of an audience.

"Seeing them excited to perform in front of an audience was a joy. Hearing them talk



with such pride about their work was absolutely wonderful. For [the] boys, the opportunity to showcase work that they are so proud of has been invaluable" DCHS Staff

When asked to reflect on what they would take away from the project, the boys said:

"Knowing I have the skills to concentrate"

"It has helped me become

more confident in speaking in front of others"

"It has helped me work with others, improve my social skills and to make friends more easily."

"I'm proud to have earned my Arts Award qualification"

We hope that this is the start of a long partnership with Mortal Fools.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme 2019

The Duke of Edinburgh **Award Scheme** encourages students to take part in volunteering, physical activities, learning new skills and going on expeditions as teams in a non-competitive environment. It provides a challenge for the students, and a great sense of achievement. It also is extremely valuable when applying for jobs and places in further education.

This year we have had 40 students working towards their Bronze DofE, and 7 towards their Gold. They have been working all year towards their Volunteering, Physical and Skill sections, and have been away with Adventure Northumberland training and taking part in their expeditions.

The Bronze teams attended a training weekend in the



Ingram Valley learning first aid, basic navigation, route planning and camping skills, culminating in a day's training hike to give them confidence for the assessed expeditions. The evenings were spent cooking on expedition stoves and toasting marshmallows around the campfire. The assessed expeditions took place along the Coquet and Northumbrian Coast, hiking full pack with remote supervision.

Every student completed their expeditions successfully, with some great projects on route such as photography and art and one team collected litter along the whole route. They all camped at the beautiful Walkmill Campsite where as part of their expedition they cooked their evening meal on camping stoves. They all demonstrated great camping and navigation skills, and fabulous team work. Notably, one team came to







the rescue of an elderly lady in Warkworth who had taken a fall, and offered first aid and stayed with her until help arrived.

The Gold team completed a five day training course and practice expedition in the Cheviots. The training included detailed navigation including walking on bearings, triangulation, modelling contours in clay and emergency scenarios. Their practice expedition included wild camping (camping with no facilities such as water taps

and toilets) and the ascent of Hedgehope. A challenging route which the students did incredibly well on, reaching the summit well ahead of schedule. The team is now planning



their assessed expedition, and also looking forward to their Residential experiences with students traveling as far as Tanzania.



Adventure Northumberland will be running Bronze, Silver and Gold DofE next year, and will run assemblies in September to introduce the scheme to students who would like to join the adventure and set themselves new challenges for the year ahead.



Public Services Course! That's not a real school course, is it?

The Public Services Course has been running since 2004. It was introduced to give students the opportunity to work on life skills. The brainchild of deputy head, Steve Handley, who believed that students needed to prepare themselves for the workplace. In the early days, there were no qualifications, just pure experiences. However it has developed and we are now delivering BTEC qualifications at levels 1, 2 and 3.



The course has always set out to make students informed individuals and to teach them the skills they need to leave school, get a job and to be successful. Teachers such as Richard Wood (Ex 202 Squadron Pilot) Sue Forrest (Outdoor Activity Instructor), Darren Drummond (Ex Fighter Controller Officer) and Neale Brown (RAF Regiment NCO) have brought a wealth of knowledge and experience to the course over the years.

Our students spend time working on team and communication skills, looking at the process of getting a job, and developing other skills and qualities they need when they leave school. They research the various public services, the careers available and the academic qualifications required for certain roles. This gives impetus to students to realise their potential in other subjects.

Fitness plays a massive part in the lessons with runs and PT sessions. Students are introduced to battlefield PT, box sessions, mud runs, beach runs and the dreaded Bearpit. Discipline is set at a high standard and instead of detentions, press-ups are given. Our aim is to teach personal discipline with each student aiming to set their standards high.

The success of courses such as ours relies

heavily on assistance from the different services around Northumberland and we have been really lucky to have had support from various organisations.

Visits to different Public Service establishments have been frequent, especially to military bases who were keen to show students exactly what service life was really like. Royal Air Force Boulmer has been exceptional with their assistance and has hosted our course on many occasions, providing training in fire fighting, team building, military training, fitness, visits to 202 Squadron, the school of Fighter Control, Fire Section and the Regiment Section. Albemarle Barracks, near Hexham, have run assault courses, team activities and demonstrations. Our courses have visited Acklington Prison to find out what life in prison is like for both staff and inmates. We have had visits by the Northumbria police dog section, presentations from North East Ambulance and Northumbria Fire and Rescue Services have taken time to show what exactly it means to be a Fire Fighter with visits to their HQ at Cramlington.

Over the years we have given our student's so many experiences such as camouflage



concealment in the pastures, anti-ambush drills in the school minibus, casualty evacuation and first aid just to name a few. Lessons are certainly not the run of the mill, we even have been known to skin rabbits and cook them on improvised stoves. Our students have explored Simonside and Thrunton woods practising their map reading skills, planned and completed Orienteering courses in Hulne Park, Druridge Bay and Plessey Woods. We have canoed and kayaked all of the region's main rivers and both Blyth and Amble Harbours. Our students have climbed all of the major crags in the area (Coby Crags, Kyloe and Bowden) and have visited High and Low ropes courses.

For the last 14 years, we have run expeditions to paddle Scottish rivers and lochs, normally taking 20 students from Year 10, wild camping and cooking for themselves along the way. This has proved to be very popular and has given the students an experience that they will definitely not forget. One student said "The expedition was one of the best experiences I've ever been on. It was a real testing experience and I've come out a stronger person". Another said "The people we went with were so lovely and I've done things I never thought I could do. I would 100% like to do it again".

All our students are taught how to write a letter, a basic CV, complete an application form, and take part in mock interviews. As well as this, all students have a basic understanding of First Aid. Some of our students have coaching qualifications or leadership awards but mainly they are all informed individuals who have looked at different options open to them. They walk away from the course as mature, confident young adults. We have past students who have joined the military, Fire and Rescue and Ambulance services. I constantly bump into students who have gone into careers in the local area and further afield, all look back on this course with fondness and assure me that they did learn something, but more importantly they had fun doing it!

We are constantly being asked to show results for what we do, I can honestly say that the students who have taken part in the Duchess's High School Public Services can do that. I'm proud to be part of their life journey.
