COVID isolation reminder.


As you will know from last weeks HT Blog the period of isolation is slightly shortened. Just to clarify:

3 MARCH 2022

Day Zero is the day a positive test is received and Day One is the following day. On Day 5 your child needs to take a Lateral Flow Test if this is negative and on Day 6 they take a lateral flow test before coming into school which is also negative they can come to school on this day. If they are still testing positive they need to remain off school until they are testing negative.





Reading at Whittingham C of E

Historically we have always had extremely high standards of reading at Whittingham C of E Primary School and have been fantastically supported by families reading to their children as well as listening to their children read when they bring their school books home on a daily basis to enable this to happen. All our curriculum areas have a helpful information page on the school website. Reading is included on our English page https://whittingham.eschools.co.uk/website/curriculum\_areas/542477. I am curriculum lead for English with Miss Dick ( when she returns from Maternity Leave) having responsibility for English English and Phonics. #### Daily Read

Across the school class teachers and support staff regularly hear children read, this may be individually or as part of a group. The children are also read to on a daily basis. Books are carefully chosen to match topics, spark interest in recent events or for children to immerse themselves in listening to a good book and for this class teachers access quality books from recognised sources, in particular Pie Corbett's Reading Spine. The intention is that over 7 or 8 years, children are read to, enjoy, discuss and work with around 82 core books. These 'essential reads' are a store of classics, creating a living library inside a child's mind. This is the 'Reading Spine'.

#### Great Books

Great books build the imagination. The more we read aloud expressively, and the more children are able to savour, discuss and reinterpret literature through the arts, the more memorable the characters, places and events become, building an inner world. Each great book develops the imagination and equips the reader with language.

#### **Great Stories**

Great stories speak to us as individuals and some children will return to certain books again and again.
Great stories also build our language because around 75 per cent of our vocabulary comes from our reading. Reading develops the ability to think in the abstract; to follow lines of thought. Schools that have a reading spine, build a common bank of stories that bind the community together. These are shared and deeply imagined common experiences.

#### What is the Reading Spine?

The Reading Spine should be central to every school's book stock, but should also be supplemented by many other books. In the Foundation Stage and Year 1, there is a suggested spine of 12 great picture books with which children should build a strong acquaintance.

Year 2 is a transition year, with both great picture books and 'chapter stories' included. The daily readaloud programme is supplemented by guided, shared and independent reading.

In the Reading Spine at Key Stage 2, there are six novels in each year with a focus on one core picture book. This leaves enough space for teachers to add their own enthusiasms and new finds.












# Developing a Love of Reading











**Book Chat**
